DOUGLAS W. DAY was born in Los Angeles, California in 1940.

Day attended the University of Oregon and graduated in 1964 with a Bachelor of Architecture degree. Shortly after graduating he began working with the firm of Stone Marraccini Patterson Architects in San Francisco. In 1969 he was made Chief of the Specifications Division and the following year was elected an Associate. In 1975 he became Associate Director; in 1977 he became a partner and, in May 1990 Day was elected Vice President of the firm. In 1997 he left SMP and formed his own specifications consulting firm, Douglas Day Associates.

In May of 1965, Day joined the San Francisco chapter of CSI. After serving on several chapter committees, he was elected chapter 2nd Vice President in January of 1968. The following July Day began a term as 1st Vice President. He was elected President in 1970. While serving as 1st Vice President, Day also served as Chairman of the Region 11 Conference Committee.

Day began his service on the national level in 1971 when he was appointed to the Institute Information Systems Committee. The following year he was appointed chairman. In 1974, Day was elected to a three year term as Institute Director from the West Region. Upon completion of his term as Director he was elected to two consecutive terms as Institute Vice President. In 1981 Day served as a member of the Institute Long-Range Planning Committee.

Day is known for his interest in education and his efforts towards the advancement of the science of construction. For several years he served as a member of the National Delphi Panel. He also made major contributions to specifications through his work with the Veterans Administration in helping to develop specifications for the Veterans Administration's Hospital System.

Day received the San Francisco Chapter's Presidents Award in 1971 and a Chapter citation in 1972. He served as president of the Construction Sciences Research Foundation (CSRF) from 1999 through 2004, and continues
