

# William Goudek, Jr., FCSI

WILLIAM GOUDEKET, JR., was born in 1924 in New Rochelle, New York. His home town is Larchmont, New York, where he graduated from Mamaroneck High School in 1942.

In 1943 he entered the U.S. Army Air Force and was assigned to the 533rd Bomb Squadron, 381st Bombardment Group (Heavy); Eighth Air Force, in England. He completed 35 missions as armorer and ball turret gunner on a B-17 Flying Fortress, receiving the Air Medal and five Oak Leaf Clusters. Upon returning to the United States he served as a B-29 gunnery instructor in Fort Myers, Florida. He was discharged in 1945.

Goudek received a Bachelor of Architecture degree from the Oklahoma A&M College of Architecture in 1951. After graduation, he worked for Boese and Harkrider Architects in Fort Worth, Texas, as well as at other firms in Fort Worth, Ponca City, and Ardmore. In 1968, he moved to Tulsa, where he joined HTB, an architectural, engineering, and planning firm. He served as HTB's Director of Specifications, Director

of Construction Observation, and Director of Architectural Production, and retired in 1989. (HTB was bought out by Dewberry & Davis in 1996.) He also was a member of AIA.

William joined the Tulsa Chapter in 1968 and became chapter president in 1973. In 1975, he helped organize and charter the Oklahoma State University Student Chapter. Through his efforts, the Tulsa Chapter created a \$500 Traveling Fellowship, awarded each year since 1976, allowing one or more students to attend Institute conventions.

From 1975 to 1977, he was South Central CSI Region Participating Member of CSI's Education Committee.

In 1984 the Tulsa CSI Foundation, Inc., was created to fund scholarships for scientific and educational purposes related to construction science and technology. Goudek served as President of the Foundation in 1990 - 1991, continued to serve on its board, and aided in awarding a total of 27 scholarships as of February, 1997.

William passed away 20 October 2017.
