BOB KENWORTHY was born in Maywood, California. Frequent family moves resulted in Bob attending 8 different schools while growing up. Bob attended Washington State University (Go Cougs!), receiving degrees in Architecture and Construction Management. Bob is a licensed architect and NCARB certificate holder.

In the flat Northwest economy of 1980, Bob was fortunate to be the third of 50 students in his class to receive a job offer, just two and half weeks before graduation. Bob started work at Rue and Butler Architects on the Monday after graduation and stayed for 15 years. He specialized in construction management and specifications. He also joined and became active in CSI.

Bob settled in University Place two weeks after graduation. After moving frequently while growing up, he was determined to put down roots. So far that determination has held. Bob and his family live a couple of miles from the office where he started work in June 1980. Bob has served as

a youth group leader, mission trip leader, Elder, and President of the Board of Directors at University Place Presbyterian Church. He has also served for 19 years on the committee responsible for planning, designing, and implementing capital development at Camp Sound View.

Auburn School District (ASD) has played an ongoing role in Bob’s career. His first job was dependent on passage of an ASD school bond. Over the next 18 years, Bob worked on projects at most of ASD’s facilities. In 1998, Bob joined ASD’s Capital Projects Department as a Project Coordinator.
