It's An Exciting Process

How exciting it is for the Jury of Fellows to have completed its work this year! Well, that is, we have almost completed the most exciting part of our responsibility, i.e. identifying those nine hardworking CSI members that will be invested as Fellows in the Institute in Indianapolis. There can be nothing more rewarding than participating in the process that recognizes such distinguished members. One of the Jury members stated that, “This is the most humbling experience of my life”. I am sure that other Jury members over the years have shared that exact feeling.

All Institute, Region and Chapter leaders can perpetuate the excitement! As CSI FY2009 draws to a close, it's past time to begin the quest that can result in one of your own chapter members walking up to receive the Fellow medal in June, 2010. If you haven't started already, then get going! Here's how:

1. If your chapter/committee has submitted a nominee for Fellow that was not elevated, revisit that dossier. Find the College of Fellow's mentor in your region, and quiz them thoroughly. Most nominations that fail are in that category because the information was incomplete, the technicalities were not there, and/or some other infraction in documentation was missed, not because the member is undeserving. Get the committee moving again, and, do, please, involve the nominee in the process. The nominee can, literally, make the notable

work “come alive” on paper. After all, they are the ones that made it all happen in the first place.

2. If your chapter has not submitted a nominee for Fellow, then look around you. Many times local work, chapter work, is overlooked, or devalued. Our grassroots members who have, for years, made CSI great are just as deserving of this elite recognition as those of us who have been privileged to serve at region or Institute levels. Without the devoted, persevering chapter pillars that generate, educate, and administrate, the Institute could not be strong!
3. Don't wait until the last month before deadline to begin the process. Most successful nominations take months of dedicated work. You don't want to tell how great your nominee is, you want the Jury to, literally, “see” the person and “grasp” their notable accomplishments. Involve more than one or two people in the process. A committee that numbers 4 or 5 can bring more expertise to the table. And, of course, that College of Fellow's mentor can provide an objective, critical eye when the package is about finished.

The FY 2009 Jury of Fellows thanks everyone for the valuable support, comments, suggestions, and attention. If you haven't already, make plans to visit and peruse the four Class of 2009 dossiers that will be on display in the CSI Booth in Indianapolis. It's an excellent way to see how success looks in its final form.

Preservation of Fellow Medals

Letter to the Editor

Greetings Fellows,

Have you missed me? Have no fear (or be very afraid!), I'll be back to active duty before you know it. I've missed all of my CSI friends tremendously and when each new conference and convention notice pops into my e-mail, I've got to exercise extreme self-control to not run off to convention and, instead, stay focused on my commitments to accomplish what I set out to do: I've taken something of a hiatus from CSI activities in order to work on getting my NCARB certification. For the past two years, all my “spare” time has been dedicated to that and to preparing Howard Levine's Fellowship nomination. I was proud to learn that Howie was elevated to Fellow in 2008. The NCARB is a different story, which is my purpose for writing.

Three times now, NCARB has declined to certify me through the Broadly Experienced Architect (“BEA”) process. I don't want to bore you with all the details, but the gist is this: they keep saying that I'm not demonstrating how my professional experience (these past 20+ years) has compensated for my educational deficiencies (I have a BA, not a BArch). Thinking about how valuable our Fellowship mentors are - Our NE Region Fellowship mentor, Dick Eustis, was instrumental to our work on Howie's nomination package - I asked NCARB if they might suggest someone to mentor me with dossier preparation and got a very clear “no” answer from them (with subtext of “that's your problem” and “you figure it out”).

So, I'm appealing to the CSI Fellows: Is anyone (or does anyone know anyone) who has been NCARB-certified through the BEA process willing to review my dossier, offer comments, and generally, mentor me through this?

Thanks in advance for any guidance you may offer.

FELLOWS NEEDED TO SERVE AS STUDENT MENTORS AT CONVENTION

Do you remember your first Institute convention? Were you helplessly wandering around trying to figure out what activities and programs would be of most benefit to you? Do you remember any friendly faces (other than perhaps your fellow chapter members) who were there to give you guidance and advice?

In order to support the Academic Affairs Committee's (AAC) goal of bringing our student participation back to the levels we enjoyed before moving to the April time frame, the committee is planning a renewed effort at the convention to make it a memorable experience. And here is where **I challenge the fellows** to get involved...

First, I would like to see at least one student from each chapter be represented at the convention. And this just won't happen without some financial assistance. In the SC region, many of our chapters have set aside funds to help with this effort, and the region also kicks-in. With the registration costs being minimal, and doubling up on hotel rooms, the cost is really not much if air fare is purchased early. Please encourage your chapters and regions to help support this goal.

Second, the AAC is planning a student and educator caucus from 8-9 am on Wednesday, June 17 (just prior to the "first timer's" orientation), for the students to learn about all the opportunities afforded to them at the convention. I would like to see the fellows attend this event and get paired-up with a student to be a mentor during the convention. While there may be some members from their local chapter or region also serving in a similar capacity, this would give them another resource for information, guidance, and perspective on what the convention holds for them. Your participation can include helping them select education

sessions, guiding them through the exhibit hall the first day, helping them find the all-important hospitality rooms, and perhaps even attending some off-site tours planned if bus capacity allows. It will also give them someone else (hopefully, but not necessarily within their same field of study) to be a resource as to how CSI and the convention has helped advance the fellows' career. If I could hear from each of you who are interested in participating (just a brief email would be sufficient), then we can begin to collect names and determine the level of support to make this happen.

"Has Anybody Heard From ...?"

"Has anybody heard from ...?" More than a few conversations at CSI conferences and chapter meetings start like that. We're a "maturing" organization, which means that many of our founding and early chapter members have or will soon retire. More than a few of our retiring members become lost to CSI. Some chapters do a fine job of engaging retired members; others haven't learned the tricks that make that work.

Fellows are in an excellent position to help chapters recognize members making the transition to retirement. It's an achievement that deserves recognition. The Institute has two member categories that recognize our retired members:

Retired Member: For members who have reached the age of sixty-five, have retired from active professional life, and have been members in good standing of the Institute continuously for at least five years prior to retirement. (NOTE: The Institute Secretary has the authority to waive the age requirement if appropriate justification is submitted)

Member Emeritus: For members who have reached the age of seventy, and have been members in good standing of the Institute continuously for at least fifteen years. Members emeritus are recognized by their use of the suffix "Member Emeritus."

To be recognized as a Retired Member/Member Emeritus, the chapter must certify the member's qualifications and request the change of status by the Institute through correspondence with the Institute Secretary. Unaffiliated members may make a request directly to the Institute Secretary.

Retired Members/Members Emeritus enjoy discounted annual membership dues for Institute membership. Many chapters also have corresponding membership categories that help encourage continued involvement of our senior members.

"Has anybody heard from ... you?" Fellows can assist in monitoring the status of our experienced members, and keeping them and chapter officers informed of the process for recognizing our retired members. We are also in a position to encourage our chapter boards to establish parallel

membership status for Retired/Emeritus members on the local level, with appropriate annual dues.

Look around. Who don't you see? Call them, then call the chapter president and get that letter written to the Institute Secretary. Don't let our retired members get dropped from the rolls of the Institute once they move onto fixed incomes and can no longer pay dues through business expenses.

Our retired members carry our CSI history. They're the ones with the strongest networks. They may be the members that help encourage new members to stay involved, or help with phone trees, or help make dinner conversations worth coming back for. As Fellows, we can help our chapters benefit from this longevity by keeping our retired members connected. Consider this an assignment. Report back next year.

Fellowship Mentoring



Early this year, perhaps inspired by a CSI show, I decided to do a little investigative work and find out what I could about Carl Heimbrodt. The only information we had is that he became a Fellow in 1963. Because the name is not common, I thought it likely that any reference I found with that name would be about Carl or a relative. Although I did not try to verify my assumption at the time, while writing this article I consulted the howmanyofme.com website, and learned that there are only 337 Heimbrodts in the US, and probably only one Heimbrodt with any given first name.

A Google search turned up a playbill from a 1967 production of Anything Goes at the Downers Grove Civic Theatre in Downers Grove, Illinois. Under "Patrons of the Theatre" I found Mr. & Mrs. Carl Heimbrodt. I also found links to other theatre groups; apparently, Ella Heimbrodt was quite active in this area. I contacted three different theatre groups, but all they could tell me was that Carl was born in June 1891 and died in May 1980, and that the Heimbrodts lived in Western Springs, Illinois, more than sixty years. I contacted the Chicago and Northern Illinois Chapters, but received no additional information.

The reason for recounting this tale is not that playing detective is fun (though it is!), but to emphasize the importance of good records. For an organization that is founded on good communication, we don't do a good job keeping track of our own history. We shouldn't have much trouble finding out about recent Fellows, but the further back we go, the less likely it is that we will be able to learn enough to create a biography for one of our "missing" friends.

It is hard to believe that it has been almost a year since we assembled in Las Vegas for our last annual meeting. During the past several months the COF executive committee and committee chairs have worked on several fronts to provide a roadmap for the College to use as we move forward. Last June we set some pretty lofty goals, though we didn't achieve all of them, I am happy to report we made significant progress on many of them.

Goal 1 - Mentor Program: Thanks to the efforts of Jack Klemeyer we have implemented improvements to the mentoring program. The Fellow Mentoring Guidelines were updated and posted on the Fellow website. We had 22 Fellows volunteer to be mentors and were available to advise nominees and those preparing nominations. Information about the Mentoring program and the list of mentors was added to CSINet.org.

Goal 2 - Newsletter Support: The Fellows newsletter published by Gilman Hu and Edited by Dick Eustis continues to be our chief form of communication between Fellows. You will always find some informative articles written by Fellows about their personal involvement in CSI programs and activities. Thanks Gilman and Dick for all of your hard work.

Goal 3 - Website Improvements: Sheldon Wolfe has done a great job of improving and expanding the information available on our website (www.fcsinet.org). We still need help in completing the Fellows biographies, so if you haven't already finished yours, please do. Our goal remains to have this information 100 percent complete. If you haven't been online lately, give our site a look.

Goal 4 - Fellows Reception / Annual Meeting: You will note that we are trying something new in Indianapolis. This year will have the Fellows Reception on Wednesday evening following the Welcome Reception. From 6:30 to 7:30 PM will be honoring the new Fellows with introductions and a hosted toast. Your spouses are invited and encouraged to attend. On Thursday morning from 7:30 – 9:00 AM we will convene the Annual Business Meeting of the College of Fellows. This will be a breakfast event and you will find the reservation form in this issue of the newsletter. Don't forget to reserve your place. The COF executive committee looks

forward to your feedback concerning the new schedule to help us plan for next year.

Goal 5 - COF Support for Students and Emerging

Professionals: We did not come close to reaching our goal of raising \$37,000 for the new SEP Fund. To date 25 Fellows have contributed \$8,875 to the fund and committed to another \$12,400 over the next four years. Though we did not reach our goal for 2009 we did commit \$1,500 to support the SEP activities in Indianapolis to help cover expenses related to the Student Competition – Segway Shelter Design Competition scheduled as part of CONSTRUCT2009. I want to thank the 25 Fellows who have already contributed and ask all other Fellows to consider contributing to this effort. No contribution is too small or too large. A contribution form can be downloaded from our website.

SEP Mentors: Kathy Proctor and Doug Hartman are continuing to identify volunteers who would be willing to assist students and emerging professionals to get the most out of their participation at CONSTRUCT2009. Past mentors have reported that the experience was very satisfying. If you are attending the convention this year please consider helping with this important program.

Eustis Fund: I am excited to report that Dick Eustis has contributed an additional \$2,500 to the Eustis Endowment Fund. The fund balance stands at \$13,228.86. Dick established this fund in the CSI Foundation to provide support for COF activities and programs. This year the Executive Committee decided to leave the interest income in the fund to help it grow. We thank Dick for his friendship and generosity.

Farewell to a Past President: By now many of you may be aware, but for others I am sorry to relay that Bill Riesberg, FCSI, passed away on April 24 while playing golf. Bill was a long time contributor to CSI and a former Institute President.

Thank You: Unfortunately I will not be able to attend the annual meeting this year due to a conflict of dates with the NCARB Annual Meeting that occurs at the same time in Chicago. I do however; want to take this opportunity to personally thank each and every member of the executive committee and the committee chairs for all of their hard work and support of the COF over the past year. It has been an honor to be chancellor of the college and I hope that I can be of service to the college and the Institute for many more years. Have a great 2010!
